Please reach out to us if you have any questions, ideas or concerns. We want our members to learn and the club to grow. Hope to see you there!



# **Monthly Tips**

- Exert from Snips 'N Clips, January 1983, Edith's Corner, by Edith Sorge.

"When the leaves have fallen from the deciduous trees, spray the trees with a [horticultural spray or other insecticide] to kill scale and overwintering insects. Don't spray evergreens with any oil-based sprays...

Go collecting! It's fun and rewarding most of the times, but don't dig up the whole countryside and don't expect everything that you dig to live.

Watch for drying winds. Your trees should not get completely dry at this time. Also watch for unusually cold days and nights. If the temperature goes below 20°F, protect your trees by taking them into an unheated garage or room. If you have no good place, place your trees under the benches onto the ground and group them closely together to keep them from freezing [the use of freeze cloths are also helpful]... The warmth of the ground will help to protect the trees if they are placed on [the ground] instead of being left on the benches. Water bonsai thoroughly prior to a hard freeze, then not again until the temperatures are above freezing. Never water frozen bonsai! The cooling caused by evaporation will rob your bonsai of the last heat it has."

Below are additional winterizing bonsai techniques for South Texas. I believe this was originally published by David W. but I am not 100% sure.

- 1. Look over your bonsai area clean, remove, and eliminate debris such as leaves, lumber, rocks, etc. Piles of debris can harbor damaging insects, snails, and other unwanted critters.
- 2. Examine your bonsai, including any container plants (pre-bonsai). It is a very good idea to remove ¼ to ½ inch of soil, from the top, and replace it. This helps eliminate weed seeds and some insect eggs/larva. Be cautious about Buttonwood as they are sensitive to some sprays.
- 3. The temperature is now lower, and the days are shorter be cautious about your watering. Less water is needed but do not allow the soil to dry out. The wind is more of a problem and can really dry the soil. Don't assume that since there are no leaves you do not need to watch the moisture levels. Consider a wind break if your space is open.
- 4. Consider grouping like "needs" trees together. This will help with watering demands and make it easier to check trees.
- 5. Check the wiring fall growth can make the branches swell. Remove old wire and go ahead and do new wiring if you wish. Be careful of brittle branches. When

trees dropped their leaves; it is very good time to look at the design and make corrections.

6. We have trouble growing moss but if you are lucky you may have to remove it if found growing on the trunk. It tends to retain too much moisture and may cause rotting.

#### **Treating Bonsai**

- 1. Taking care of the fall flush of insects is possible with a light horticultural oil. An organic spray can also be used such as Garrett Juice or a home recipe of: 1T liquid kelp, 1T fish emulsion, 5% apple cider vinegar, and 5% molasses all added to a gallon of water. This is also a light fertilizer and helps with those nutrients especially on evergreens.
- 2. Stop feeding deciduous trees, fertilizer with a low nitrogen content can be used on all evergreens and conifers. Kelp is an excellent source of the essential minor elements.

#### Sever Cold (more than 24 hours)

- 1. Place outside trees on the ground and mulch around them for protection. Small bonsai and small containered trees mean trouble with an extended cold. Place these bonsai in a garage, cold frame, or even a cold/unheated room.
- 2. The sub-tropicals and tropicals already should be in a heated well-lit greenhouse or room. Take care of these on very cold nights by possible adding a second heater. The light requirements for these plants require 12 to 14 hours of daylight.
- 3. The home environment can be a very dry atmosphere with our furnaces running. At times, our homes can be dryer than a typical desert. Make sure your trees have moisture trays or are misted regularly.

Lastly, I want to thank all the members that participated in our events in 2023. The list is too long to mention everyone in this opening President's Letter, but just know that SABS cannot be successful without all your contributions and 2023 was very successful. Our mission is to help educate people in this beautiful art that we call Bonsai, and we did just that in 2023. We expanded our membership to the highest it has been over the past 5 years; we introduced the Art of Bonsai to countless people through our exhibits at the Botanical Gardens and our presence in social media (with over 990 members following us on Facebook).

With all that we accomplished in 2023, this year's Board of Directors is setting the goal even higher.
