Walter Pall lives near Munich Germany and is one of the first Europeans to work with indigenous species, which he collects in his beloved Alpine mountains. Walter acquired his first bonsai in 1978 and since then he has received over 35 national and international awards. In his own garden he has over 1000 bonsai, mainly European species of which most were collected. Walter has published many articles in bonsai magazines throughout the world. He has been a board member of many originations including Germany, Europe worldwide. and internationally with **BCI**.

Walter loves to lead workshops where he sets the main focus on teaching the artistic side of bonsai. Walter has a more modern teaching technique to get the student inspired and to see all options to styling their tree. Walter gives clear indications of the pros, the cons and describes ways to continue working with the trees. 
Walter's workshop is a thorough tree critique of all trees brought in. Walter will look at all species of trees and of all ages from pre-bonsai to 50+ year old bonsai. It must be stressed that Walter's way of running workshops is different from what is often done: He makes it clear what options are on each tree but, tries to never touch it. The students do the work and he watches them - not the other way around. He only helps when really necessary and when asked, but he will not style somebody's tree in a workshop. It must be clear that he's trying not to be a bonsai fundamentalist. While it is made clear what he would do personally, every student can do what they want to do in his workshops. He does not touch people's trees normally, he gives them several options and inspires people to do what they really can do for themselves. Walter doesn't make the decision for them, he wants people to walk away with the strong feeling that they have done it themselves and they can do it again. This is interesting not only to the owner of the tree, but also to the other workshop participants.


Walter wants to be inundated with trees – the more the "merrier", he says. With that, **please bring 2-4 trees and your tools, if you wish**. The amount of time spent with each tree will depend on the number of trees. This is a great way for beginners to get an early perspective of where a tree could be in 5 to 10 years as well as an intermediate or expert to get their tree from a great bonsai to a show quality specimen.

As mentioned earlier, Walter will view all species, but he specializes in pines, junipers, and deciduous trees, though he will critique tropicals as well.

TRANSPLANTING

1 Why is it necessary

There are several important reasons why it is necessary to periodically transplant bonsai and they arise from the basic definition itself:; a tree planted in a pot.

If you were to let a tree grow in the same pot, untouched, within a few years the roots would fill the pot completely so that water and air would no longer circulate. Without water and air the roots cannot take in nourishment and the tree would certainly die.

Before this occurs it is likely that lack of oxygen would have caused the roots to rot.

The roots also age and inside a few years, there would be only thick roots with no feeder roots. There would come a time, moreover, when the soil would simply cease to be an adequate medium for the sustenance of the tree. Little by little the size of the granules would be decreased until finally they would have become dust. That means that the soil would lose its...... capacity to retain water, air and nutrients.

Transplanting and root pruning, therefore, serves the dual purpose of renewing the soil and strengthening the development of the root system, continually rejuvenating it.

2 Relationship between branches and roots

Since roots are beneath the soil, it is only possible to examine them at the time of transplanting.

However, the way they are growing is easily determined from the state of the crown of the tree.

Roots and crown are tightly linked; in fact, it can be stated that the crown is a mirror of the roots.

If the crown has little ramification, then undoubtedly the rootball will be formed by a few thick roots. On the contrary, if it has a great deal of ramification, the roots will be abundant and fine.

In Addition, generally, the thick branches are located on the.....

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same side of the tree where there is also a thick root underneath the soil.

The same thing is true if, although you try a thousand different ways, a trunk refuses to grow straight: there is probably a curled up taproot.

3 Frequency 4 Guidelines

The necessity for or frequency of transplanting depends a great deal on the species in question. Normally, roots of deciduous species grow more rapidly than those of evergreens.

Young trees also grow more rapidly than old ones, so that they need more frequent transplanting.

Of course, the climate in which the trees are growing influences the rhythm of growth and consequently, also the necessity for transplanting. The frequency of transplanting can also be anticipated and modified according to the training plan for a bonsai.

If you want to have rapid....

Growth, then transplant less often; if you want fine ramification, then it is best to transplant every year. But, of course, if the roots are coming out through the drainage holes, if water does not drain, or the leaves wither, transplanting is urgent.

The time having arrived, it is very helpful to let the soil dry out before transplanting, this way, it will be much easier to remove the old soil from the roots.

4 Tools for transplanting

For transplanting, various tools and equipment are necessary both for the pruning of roots and the replanting of the tree as well as for preparation of the pot, mixing of the soils, placing of the tree in the pot and securing it in the same.


Since you will need them during all of the phases of transplanting, it is very convenient to have them prepared and ready beforehand.

Some of them are not essential, but all are very helpful. In particular, scissors are the most important.

When choosing scissors, look for quality and always keep them clean and sharp; a badly made cut can set back or impede the formation of new roots, and also can be a focal point for their putrefaction. In addition to cleaning them after use, it is a good idea to have one set of scissors for roots and another set for branches as it is inevitable that, with use, the blade will be damaged by the hard particles in the soil mix.

Something that will help the work greatly is a turntable; it permits the tree to be easily viewed at eye level and worked on from all sides. Items on the right: Twine, Wire, Soil, moss, Sprayer, Root scissors and Grafting knife.

Items below: Needle nose pliers, stiff brush for cleaning trunk, Branch cutter, Wire cutters, Root pruners.
