Sept 2017 Wow y'all, this has been an exciting last few days! First the wonder and excitement of the eclipse, then the (not!) fun and excitement of prepping for a hurricane! That is an awful lot of work – moving plants to safety, boarding up, and clearing the yards of any potential projectiles (lots of that in our yard!). Being 50+ miles due west of Harvey's eye landfall, we were lucky he didn't hit us too hard, receiving 2.5" of rain and lots of strong band winds for days. Harvey did vent his wrath further up the coast and deliver the deluging rains as predicted, most unfortunate for our neighbors in East Texas, they're in our thoughts.

But like all unwanted guests, Harvey is reluctant to leave our area so we have more rain forecasted for the next few days. If you have any bonsai out in the weather, watch to make sure they aren't getting too waterlogged. If rains persist, move them out of rain, tip up on one end a little to help with drainage. Don't worry about the water lovers (cypresses and such) since they are loving this. But consider doing a good fungicide treatment all around once the rains stop.

As things dry out again, be sure to protect pots from overheating - isn't gardening in South Texas such fun? But the good thing is we should still have about 6 weeks of growing weather before that autumn switch turns on and plants start to shutdown for winter.

Sub/ Semi-tropical can *safely* be repotted with about 2 months of warm weather left. There should be at least 4 to 6 weeks of good warm weather GROWTH (roots and leaves) after potting before the cooler weather starts. We have a long growing season around here that can last till around Thanksgiving or even longer. Remember to protect your tropicals from any cooler weather (50°) is a good gauge.

Deciduous plants – about now is the time they start storing nutrients for winter. Light fertilizing, but don't overfeed with nitrogen. Remember if it's growing its ok to lightly fertilize. We want to start slowing down the growth of our bonsai so that they are prepared for winter, so this will be the last feedings of the season. Watch the soils every day so they do not dry out. With the intense summer we've had, some trees might still be in their summer dormancy and may not be taking up as much water as you would expect. Be careful not to over water.

Check the soil on these plants before watering; instead of daily watering they may only need it every day and a half or two days. On the other hand, some are still taking as much water as you'll give them and more. If you're having problems with the pots overheating in our brutal summer sunlight, try covering the pot edges with draping a cloth around the pot to create shade. Also try putting blocks under the pots to lift them off the hot stands and it'll allow some air to move underneath. Small dark glazed pots are especially susceptible to overheating.

Unfortunately, insects *don't* slow down right now, keep a close look on your trees. Pests can move in overnight! Not only look for the actual pests but also look for signs of activity from unseen pests – such as half-gone leaves, webbing, Frass (worm poop), fused together or curled up leaves. Don't confuse spider webs with spider mite webbing. Daily vigorous spraying of the foliage when you water the plants prone to spider mites (junipers, cedars, and similar species) can greatly deter them from moving in. Numerous summer insects are nocturnal, during their damage in the darkness of night and are excellent at hiding during the day. Inspect your bonsai from top to bottom, also inspect the drain holes. Inspect for ANY insects/pest and treat accordingly. If you discover an infestation, treat according to the label of the pesticide. Scale and aphids seem to be the biggest nuisance right now. And of course, nothing slows down the bougainvillea looper worms from their annual march through our yards; I've been treating with the Bayer product "2in1 Systemic Rose & Flower Care" and keeping them under control. Another note when using a water soluble insecticides make sure you spray the plant thoroughly and drench the soil well until you see it coming out the drain holes, especially the bald cypress to kill the root mealy bugs. If the insecticide is labeled for veggies or roses and kills spider mites it should be safe for most if our bonsai. Ask me if you have any questions about insecticides.

It's a good idea to treat your trees for fungus (root rot) on a regular basis, monthly is usually sufficient. Treat with Maneb, Benomyl or other copper-based spray. Spray the leaves and thoroughly drench the soil, making sure the solution drains out the drain holes. Check your training wires so they aren't cutting into the branches. If they are cutting in, remove them. If the branch did not hold, re-wire in a different direction, just don't put the wire in the same place.

Be careful when trimming; hold back if the tree is not showing any signs of growth. If the tree is growing it's probably ok to trim, but keep in mind depending on the species, you could be trimming off next year's blooms and fruit.
